#### **Celebrating the Barrowby Scarecrow Competition and Open Gardens**


"A brilliant weekend...a real buzz in the village...great to see so many out and sharing the weekend with neighbours...extraordinary talent and creativity"



Each of the gardens had its own fascinating story to tell and every owner was very welcoming to all the visitors. Silver Birches – complete with Pimms – had secret waterfalls and beautiful vistas; the 'Phoenix' garden, risen from the ashes of the fire, was created within just a few months with beautiful speedwells, fuschia and lavender, serenading all the senses with classical musical accompaniment; West Cottage was a wonderful surprise with hidden hideaways, a summerhouse and emerging plants; the 'Kitchen Garden' had ponds, peas, tomatoes and tranquillity; 'Redlands' not only offered the weary traveller delicious tea and cakes but also a beautifully designed environmentally friendly garden to relax in.

# The Old Bakery on Casthorpe Road

If you didn't get the chance to visit the shop at the Old Bakery during the Open Gardens and Scarecrow weekend, you missed a wonderful opportunity to glimpse some of Barrowby's oldest history. Every village had a bakehouse and Barrowby was no exception.

The earliest written record of a building on the site dates from 1770, a bakehouse was mentioned in 1840 with the house being sold at auction in The (White) Swan in 1886 by a woman from Iowa! The Mussons, bakers, bought the property in 1896, having previously been in Malting Yard off Church Street in the 1870s. The house, along with West Cottage, remained in the Musson family until Geoffrey Musson sold West Cottage in 1997. The picture right shows the house after 1896 as the name on the baker's cart is J T Musson. It is also fascinating to see the old windmill behind the house.



The Cooleys now own the house and are thoroughly enjoying discovering about their beautiful home. There is still a trap door in the original kitchen ceiling, a plaster floor in the back bedroom and a well in the back yard. A 1797 cartwheel penny was found hidden in the reeds under one of the bedroom floor boards – the Cooleys will place a modern penny there after renovation with a short note for future owners to find.

# On the street where you live

The newcomer to Barrowby could easily be forgiven for imagining that Wong Gardens had some connection with the Orient. Perhaps named after a local worthy of Chinese descent? An interesting theory but far from the truth. Wong is an Anglo-Saxon word for a field so the street echoes ancient usage. Before the building of the estate in the 1970's there had been allotments on this site referred to as the Wong Allotments. Very appropriate therefore that the street today is Wong Gardens.

The neighbouring Hedgefield Road also tells a tale. That a field might have a hedge may seem rather obvious but the Hedgefield was a rather special field in Barrowby's past. The Hedgefield dates back to medieval times and records suggest that the hedge was significant and proof against roaming livestock; the hedge acted rather like a fortified wall providing some defence to the village. There were gates in the hedge, patrolled at night.

The origin of Church Street is clear: look up and see All Saints steeple. Chapel Lane similarly got its name from the two Methodist Chapels that were built here in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century but now long disappeared.

Adamstile was another ancient field in the parish, as was The Knolls (or Knowles). Lawson Leas was yet another field though referred to as Lanson Lees in 1833.

Other streets have gained their names from personalities from the past. Hurst Crescent is named after the Rector of All Saints at the time of the Civil War. He was a strong supporter of the Royalist cause and was ejected from his post as a result. Thorold Road refers to the Thorold family who were major landowners in the parish. Dysart Road – and the western end is just within the parish boundary – is named after the Earl of Dysart. The Earlsfield is similarly named. The

Earldom was held by the Tollemache family and the Earl lived at Buckminster Park.

Debdale Road takes its name from the Debdale Plantation, woodland near Sedgebrook and formerly part of the Thorold Estate.

So the street names we take for granted actually preserve part of the village's past.

#### The White Swan



The white swan has been awarded a place in CAMRA's GoodBeer Guide 2014. CAMRA is an organisation that Campaigns for Real Ale and has been championing pubs and drinkers rights since 1971.
