Our boat crews are already preparing for another busy cruising season, which begins on 1st April this year.

What know you of Newbo?

Did you know that Barrowby had its own Abbey? Hearsay sometimes suggests that there was some sort of monastic house in the village near the church. There is no evidence for that but there was nevertheless an Abbey in the parish.

Look at an Ordnance Survey map and you can find Abbey Farm just on the fringe of Sedgebrook.

The parish boundary is just to the east of this and here stood Newbo Abbey up until the Dissolution of the Monasteries in 1536. Mind you if the word Abbey conjures up something as imposing as Fountains then think again.

Newbo Abbey was never a large complex, perhaps housing twenty or so at the most. Also there were no monks at Newbo. It was a Premonstratensian house (named after Prémontré in France).

The Abbey was home to White Canons; canons differ from monks as they work and preach out in the community.

Newbo was founded in 1198 by Richard de Malebisse who was one of the ringleaders involved in inciting anti-Jewish riots in York that led to a massacre. Founding the Abbey may have been an act of contrition

Newbo seems to have had a rather colourful history as a religious house. Records from the time show the Abbey was frequently late in paying rent and had problems attracting and retaining Canons. Discipline also seems to have been a problem.

The Abbey was subject to periodic visitations by its parent organisation. In 1482 a ruling was made that all hunting dogs were to be expelled from the Abbey "on pain of excommunication". In 1497 the visitation resulted in

banning all games played for money. Such secular diversions hardly fit our image of the pious monk.

In the 1890's there was a lively debate in the letters page of the Grantham Journal over the true location of the Abbey. George Sills, who was both a barrister and a farmer living at Casthorpe, argued that the Abbey was based there and not near Sedgebrook.

There are fragmentary records of some form of religious site at Casthorpe and it may be that there was a chapel there but the weight of evidence does show that the Abbey was just to the north of the A52 before you reach Sedgebrook.

It is possible that in addition to the Abbey there was a hamlet of Newbo. Both are however long gone.

Scouts



Defibrillator Update

The Parish Council has met with two potential providers with the view to installing three public access defibrillators in the village. The two identified sites are the Reading Room and the Pavilion on the Lowfields. A third site is being considered in the Reedings Road/Hedgefield Road area. The defibrillators would be placed in a cabinet on an external wall/easily accessible site, in a prominent position so they can be located once a 999 call has been made. Training is seen as a key part of this project so that residents would feel confident in using the defibrillator. The Parish Council are investigating potential fund providers to support the cost of the project.
