Our Winter Skies

In December winter is well and truly with us, so who would want to sit in the garden on a December night when the temperature is below freezing? The answer of course is a keen astronomer.

So why be out in the cold in the first place? In the northern hemisphere some of the best must-see sights are only in the sky during the winter with the constellations of Taurus, Gemini and Cancer are all high in the sky throughout. Each have various objects worthy of note but the constellation of Orion the Hunter is the one which stands out above all of the others. It is bright and easy to find in the southern sky and most people recognise the three bright stars of Orion's belt.

On a clear night if you look a little way down from the central belt star, you should see a faint misty patch which marks the Orion Nebula (see picture below), an area of glowing gas in which new stars are being born. A small telescope should show four of them at its centre. This nebula is one of the few deep sky objects which show some colour, with most people reporting a faint green or blue colour.

Just below the left hand star is another famous object, the Horse Head Nebula, although to see this you need a large telescope.

If you continue down the belt stars line, you will eventually come to Sirius, the brightest star in the sky, although because it's quite low down from our latitude it may not look special.

The area of the sky around Orion is full of interesting objects and a personal favourite is just off to the left, the Rosette Nebula, which looks just as its name suggests. The central star cluster is easy to spot in a small telescope but the nebula itself requires a larger telescope.

Also climbing higher in the sky from East to West is unmissable Jupiter. It is always rewarding to watch the four main moons as they orbit the planet, sometimes casting their own shadows on its face.

So if you look out of your warm living room on a clear frosty night and see someone wondering around in the next door garden showing a passing resemblance to the Michelin Tyre man, it probably means you are living next door to an astronomer. Why not put on an extra few layers of clothes and go and ask what they are looking at, I'm sure you won't be disappointed.

'It's a Long Way'...a moving commemoration of World War One

Tim Caunt and Charlie's Ant are to be congratulated on organising a very moving evening of songs, poetry and descriptions of the Great War, which was held as a very successful fundraiser for the Memorial Hall and the British Legion Poppy Appeal last month.

Starting from the early volunteers, who lied about their age, through witness accounts of the Christmas truce, marked by the singing of 'Silent Night' in English and German, and a poignant account of 'Tommy Atkins' at the 1916 Battle of the Somme, to a medical officer's experience at Gallipoli and Melissa Blanchard's Last Post, local villagers and former army staff read testimonies and poetry from Wilfrid Owen, Siegfried Sassoon, Laurence Binyon and others to ensure that the fallen of the First World War were not forgotten.

More than £600 was raised on the night for which many thanks to all who came. Thanks also to those who cooked, cleaned, decorated, played the music, managed the bar and contributed before and during the event.
