

Rag Rug Memories

Mention rag rugs to anyone over a certain age and it immediately evokes fond memories of evenings spent as a family snipping up strips of old worn out clothing and blankets. These strips would be attached to an opened-out hessian sack and eventually, after many hours, be transformed into a practical and hard-wearing rug. I can remember such a rug in front of my grandparents' hearth.



These rag rugs were originally born out of necessity as carpets were out of the reach of poor families and so floor coverings had to be created from anything to hand. In the days of "Make Do and Mend", nothing was thrown away if it could be transformed into something for the home.

This way of thinking sadly fell out of fashion as the population grew more prosperous, but is happily making a comeback, thanks in part to TV personalities such as Kirstie Allsopp.

I enjoy many forms of craft and a couple of years ago spent a very productive day at The National Design Centre in Sleaford, being instructed in the art of proddy rugging. I was provided with a piece of hessian, strips of various fabrics and a modified clothes peg (a dolly peg with one leg cut off and the other sharpened to a point). I was hooked!

As well as rugs you can make wall hangings, brooches, cushion covers, bags; just use your imagination. I have made several items for friends and family and have created bespoke rugs (I like to call them "Memory Rugs") for people who have provided me with outgrown baby clothes that they can't bear to part with.

You can buy hessian from good craft shops and could fashion your own proddy peg, so what's stopping you? Get rag rugging and start to make some memories. *Jo Beet*
